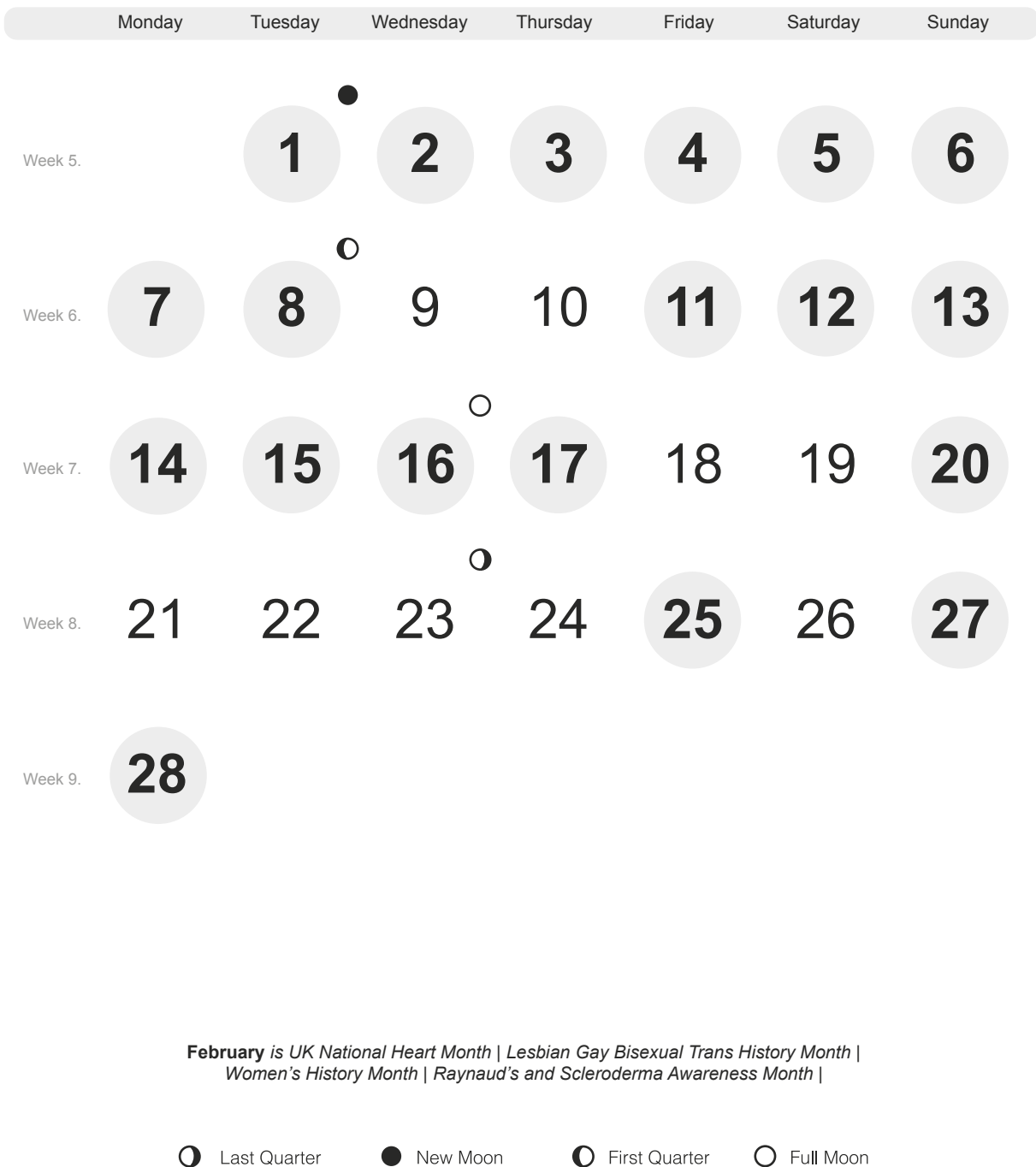
Race Equality

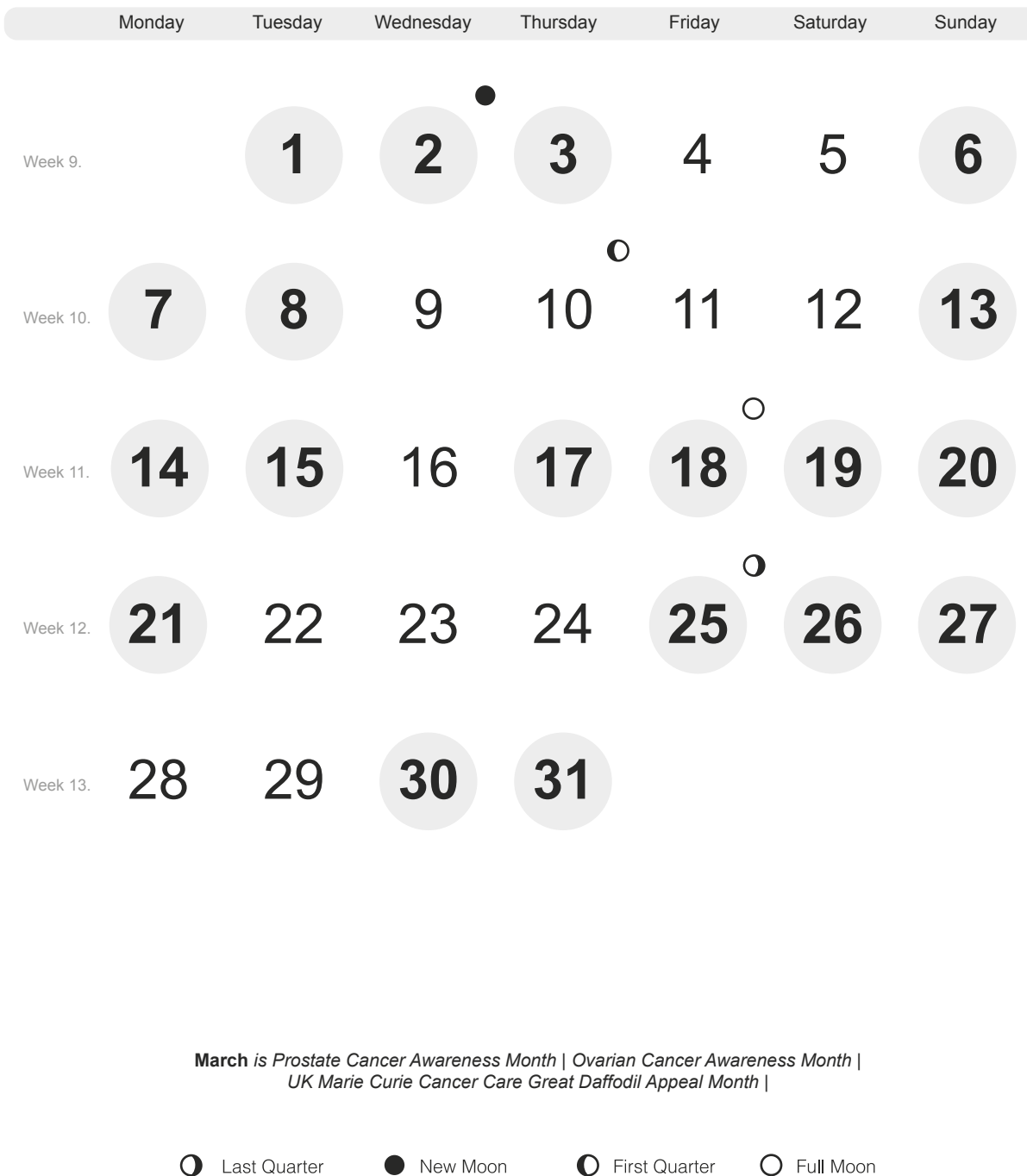

Use of Inclusive Language
